

Data-Intensive Science Components

- Capture
- Data validation through curation
 - finding the right data structures to map into various stores
 - includes the schema and the necessary metadata for longevity and for integration across instruments, experiments, and laboratories
- Analysis
 - workflow pipeline,
 - use of databases (versus a collection of flat files)
 - analysis and modeling
 - data visualization
- Permanent archiving


Massive Amounts of Data

- Petabytes of data per day
 - Australian Square Kilometre Array of radio telescopes project
 - CERN's Large Hadron Collider
 - Astronomy's Pan-STARRS5 array of celestial telescopes

Science Paradigms

- Thousand years ago: science was empirical describing natural phenomena
- Last few hundred years: theoretical branch using models, generalizations
- Last few decades: a computational branch simulating complex phenomena
- Today: data exploration (eScience)
 unify theory, experiment, and simulation
 - Data captured by instruments or generated by simulator
 - Processed by software
 - Information/knowledge stored in computer
 - Scientist analyzes database/files using data management and statistics







- Curation and long-term preservation



- Many disciplines overlap and use data from other sciences

Summary
